The focus for the second half of this year will be on Writing, Daily Reviews and the Knowledge Rich Curriculum.

A knowledge-rich curriculum aligns with the science on how students learn

Cognitive science explains that students learn best when they are supported to acquire, retain and apply knowledge. In line with the science of learning, a knowledge-rich curriculum progressively builds students' subject knowledge, with plenty of opportunities for practise, review and retrieval to support long-term retention of learning. As students acquire more knowledge, it becomes easier for them to comprehend text, understand new concepts and acquire related skills. (Australian Education Research Organisation, March 2024)

Religious Education News



Dear families.

We have almost reached the end of term 2 and I'm sure we are looking forward to the winter holidays.

A very important event that happens during the holidays is Naidoc week. National NAIDOC Week celebrations are held across Australia in the first week of July each year (Sunday to Sunday), to celebrate and recognise the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. NAIDOC Week is an opportunity for all Australians to learn about First Nations cultures and histories and participate in celebrations of the oldest, continuous living cultures on earth.

I encourage you all to attend Naidoc week activities in your local community to celebrate the indigenous cultures of our country.

A major feast day that occurs on June 24 is the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist.

# Saint John the Baptist's Story

John the Baptist was a contemporary of Christ who was known for evangelisation and his baptising of Jesus Christ.

John the Baptist was born through the intercession of God to Zachariah and Elizabeth, who was otherwise too old to bear children. According to scriptures, the Angel Gabriel visited Elizabeth and Zachariah to tell them they would have a son and that they should name him John. Zachariah was sceptical and for this he was rendered mute until the time his son was born and named John, in fulfilment of God's will.



When Elizabeth was pregnant with John, she was visited by Mary, and John leapt in her womb. This revealed to Elizabeth that the child Mary carried was to be the Son of God.

John began public ministry around 30 AD, and was known for attracting large crowds across the province of Judaea and around the Jordan River. When Jesus came to him to be baptised, John recognized him and said, "It is I who need baptism from you."

# Mini Vinnies Focus for 2024

This year our Mini Vinnies program is focusing on the theme of 'kindness'. Kindness is something we should all be showing to each other every day and can be done in the smallest way. Some random acts of kindness that people can show are:

The students identified people within our community that would benefit from some kindness shown to them. One of these groups was the elderly.

# **Mini Vinnies Visit the Elderly**

On Monday 17th June a group of Year 4 Mini Vinnies students visited the Scotchmans Creek Aged Care facility to play board games with the elderly residents. This visit was requested by our Mini Vinnies committee, in order to support our elderly people to not feel so alone and disconnected from their community. 3 of the students who went to the nursing home were asked to reflect on their visit. Here are their thoughts:

"When I arrived at the nursing home I saw on the table there was Rummikub, so I taught them how to play. It was pretty hard for them and I don't think they got it. I was playing with two nice ladies called Mary and Roma. I taught them that you have to put down 3 or more tiles that add up to 30 on your first go or you have to pick up. It was a really fun experience and I would love to do it again."

"I went to the nursing home and I visited the elderly. Ella, Suzy and myself met two ladies named Heather and Kath. We taught them a game called dominoes. First we put the double six in the middle, after that we got like five domino pieces. Then if someone had a six they put it with the six on the table. Then you keep going until

no one has any more pieces. We also built little houses. After that it was time to leave so we said goodbye."

"I visited the nursing home on the 17th of June 2024. I met a nice, kind lady named Erol and a nice man named Cliff. He had a hole in his ear. Erol and Cliff taught Spencer, Thalia and I how to play Chinese Checkers. It was a really fun game and I really enjoyed it. Cliff was awesome at Chinese Checkers and showed Thalia a really good move.

It was a really good experience and I hope to do it again. I think Erol and Cliff had a good time too."




# **SAVE THE DATE!!!!**

# What is a 'Tricky Word'?

Tricky Words or Heart Words are words that have been included in a spelling and reading program in order for students to be able to access texts. They are considered tricky as some or most of the sounds in that word have not yet been explicitly taught.


All good phonics programs have a stepped out sequence that first introduces sounds that are easy to use for blending such as s a t p i n and contain vowel letters so students can use the sounds that they have learnt to make words (we know that words need vowels or vowel sounds and longer words have multiple vowel sounds, in fact the rule is one vowel sound for every syllable).

In order to apply the knowledge of letter sounds to texts, students need repeated practice. That usually begins with multiple exposures to reading isolated words and then building to the sentence level. Once students start reading simple sentences they will encounter **high frequency words**. High frequency words (HFW), are words that students come across in texts, as the definition suggests, at a higher frequency.

# Supporting Numeracy at home



Research shows that parents and carers can give their young children a boost in learning mathematics by noticing, exploring and talking about maths during everyday activities at home or out and about (Phillipson, Gervasoni & Sullivan 2017).

# How can you help your child everyday:

- Comparing objects and describing which is longer, shorter, heavier or holds less.
- Playing with and describing two-dimensional shapes and three-dimensional objects.
- Describing where things are positioned, for example, north, outside, behind, opposite.
- · Describing, copying, and extending patterns found in everyday situations.
- Using time-words to describe points in time, events and routines (including days, months, seasons and celebrations).
- Comparing and talking about the duration of everyday events and the sequence in which they occur.
- Saying number names forward in sequence to 10 (and eventually to 20 and beyond).
- Using numbers to describe and compare collections.
- Using perceptual and conceptual subitising (recognising quantities based on visual patterns), counting and matching to compare the number of items in one collection with another.
- . Showing different ways to make a total (at first with models and small numbers).

Although these activities may seem simple and informal, they build on what your child may notice, give the opportunity to talk about mathematical ideas and language, and show children that maths is used throughout the day.

# Online gaming information for parents and carers

# Online gaming has many benefits

#### Gaming can be a way to:

- · Have fun and be entertained.
- · Relax and reduce stress.
- · Keep the mind active.
- · Develop creativity.
- Strengthen decision making and strategic skills.
- · Connect with others.

For most gamers, playing is a casual pastime. But a growing number of people play or watch competitive gaming (or eSports) as individuals, teams or families. Many gamers belong to vibrant and active communities. Gaming can be used for a range of other purposes. These include general school education, right through to specialist workplace training (for example, flight simulations and various defence and cybersecurity exercises).

While gaming often has positive effects on the mental health and wellbeing of participants, it also has risks — like most online activities.

This information sheet provides practical tips and links to further information, so you can help your child reduce the risks and maximise the positive experiences of gaming online.

# State of play

According to a major Australian gaming industry report:

- Typical daily casual game play is 10 minutes, twice a day; typical daily in-depth game play is 1 hour.
- · 47% of gamers are female.
- · 78% of gamers are over the age of 18.
- The average age of an Australian gamer is 34 years old.
- Adult players have been gaming for an average of 12 years.



Competitive gaming, known as eSports, is a multi-billion dollar industry that includes many gaming genres and titles, such as *League of Legends* and *Counter Strike: Global Offensive*. Gamers also watch eSports to learn strategies to improve gameplay.

# Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019). Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognize the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs to improve educational outcomes for students with disabilities.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disabilities.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. # Auslan

Throughout this term, all classes have explored essential topics including food, transportation, colours, emotions, lockdown and fire drill protocols and reconciliation in Auslan. Students have practiced constructing basic sentences such as 'I feel' or 'my family likes traveling by train' to enhance their language skills. As we conclude this term, the Prep and Ones will delve into the world of lip-reading, challenging each other to decipher spoken words. Year 3 and 4 students will practise their signing skills with a rendition of "Father Welcomes All His Children' while Year 5 and 6 students will embark on their Chuck Baird-inspired art projects. They will emulate Baird's distinctive style to depict hands communicating through drawings.




